 - ▶ Educated and Experienced Teachers
 - ▶ Accredited programs
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WRAPAROUND SERVICES

- ▶ Extended support to students of poverty
 - ▶ Services include: mental services, medical care, subsidized meals, tutoring, family literacy classes, parenting skills classes, and adult mentoring programs.
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METHOD


- ▶ Review previous case studies, research projects, and data relating to thesis topic
 - ▶ Observation of students
 - ▶ Review data on students
 - ▶ Compare and contrast previous research and data with students data, and observations
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RESEARCH FINDINGS

- ▶ Social skills are equally as important as academic skills
 - ▶ Need for programs geared towards 3 to 5 year olds
 - ▶ Increase access to wrap around services
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CONCLUSIONS

Comparison of Classroom Observations to the Literature

- ▶ Connection between poor parenting skills and families of low-income status
 - ▶ Both included a high level of suspension and expulsion rate for students
