TO THE EDITOR:

In response to Miss Judy Waters's letter to the Carillon, October 24, 1969, I would like to suggest that some members of this community do care!

There is concern and hope for what goes on not only here at Dominican, but also for a whole movement to change and reform in our own society and the world's. To feel a part of and to understand the phenomenon of our time, many new and perhaps frightening occurrences will take place - not only on our own campus, but in our world.

Your letter seemed to belittle the merit in everyone voting, in eliminating dress regulations that hinder even moderate expression, in peace vigils, and in Viet Nam moratoriums - even if it means missing a class. There are individuals sincerely interested in "breaking the sword" that America holds up to the rest of the world, and also in reshaping, constructively, the American society.

Perhaps you view new dress regulations, new ideas, new interestsgroup, new modes of expression, controversial happenings, and other "signs of the times" as a threat to what you may have thought was the "good life" or even the Christian life. But we live in a time of change initiated for various motives. And many are noteworthy in their intent. It's exciting to see minds come alive to new ideas and new concepts of living and working together.

Change for its own sake is not bad or devious - it is stimulating and challenging to be a part of making the best changes. When one fails to see the good and depth of many of the current trends, to fail to understand what they represent and mean to all of us, then, you are the loser.
